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

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REPORT.

It is with much regret that the Managers of the Royal Infirmary find themselves obliged to notice that, during the year 1848, the Income of the Institution has fallen short of the expenditure by the large sum of $\pounds 517$, which is considerably more than the deficiency in any previous year.

This undesireable result, they conceive, is fully explained, by taking into account the following considerations, viz. :—1st. That the whole Income of the Infirmary was £150 less than during the year 1847. 2d. That the number of Patients treated during the last year very considerably exceeded that of any former year; and 3d. That among these Patients, there were no fewer than 1648 cases of Fever, being nearly 1000 more than during the year 1847.

As connected with this last-mentioned cause of an increased expenditure, it may be noted that, as was anticipated in the former year's Report, the mortality arising from the prevalent form of Fever during the past year has been very high—having somewhat exceeded 12 per cent., as is shewn by the annexed Table, No. VII.; and though it cannot be said that the expense attending the treatment of Fever cases is strictly proportioned to the mortality arising from the disease—yet it will be admitted that a large mortality, indicating an aggravated form of the disease, will, generally speaking, be productive of increased expenditure in the treatment.

The diminution of the Income of the Infirmary, during the last year, arose partly from a falling off in the amount of Donations and Subscriptions received, and in the sum received from Medical Students, but chiefly from the diminished amount received from Church-door Collections. The Managers regard the diminution in the former items of Income as casual and probably temporary, but they fear that they cannot take the same view in regard to the falling off which has taken place in the latter source of their Revenue, seeing that it has been progressively, and almost uniformly, diminishing for many years past. That it does not arise from any want of confidence in the Institution, on the part of those who are the immediate objects of its benefits, is proved by the increasing numbers who continue to avail themselves of its aid. And the Managers cannot avoid strongly appealing to the community in general; and especially they would remind those classes who are chiefly and more directly benefited by the Institution, that the readiest and most expressive mode in which they can testify their sense of the benefits which it is capable of affording, is, by giving as they can afford to enable the Managers to continue and extend its usefulness—while the effect of continuing to withhold their contributions may, very probably, be to compel them to curtail the advantages which it presents to a large portion of the community.

In the commencement of last year, the Managers carried into effect a resolution which they had previously come to, of increasing the number of the Medical Attendants of the Infirmary, by the appointment of two additional Physicians, and two additional Surgeons, without salaries. This measure seemed to be called for, not only by the great and continually increasing number of Patients resorting to the Infirmary for treatment, but also by the fact, which was ascertained by eareful and extended enquiry, that the proportion of Patients placed under each Medical and Surgieal Attendant in this Infirmary was, and had been, for several years, considerably greater than in any other Infirmary in the United Kingdom.

These appointments necessarily involved changes of considerable importance in the arrangements of the House—and some difficulty being experienced in adjusting the division of the Wards among the large staff of Medical Officers thus formed, an arrangement was entered into, that, for the present, the additional Attendants perform the duties of their office alternately for six months each.

The Managers beg, in conclusion, to offer their best thanks to those individuals, Societies, and Congregations, who have, during the past year, contributed to the maintenance of this highly useful Institution.
