REGINALD CLAYTON BARNBY, born at York in 1867, died there on the 16th December, 1912. He served his articles with Messrs. Oldham and Bohn, of Hull, and was subsequently engaged on railway contracts in South America and Siam. In 1898 he became Resident Engineer for new works on the Hull and Barnsley Railway.

Mr. Barnby was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 6th December, 1892.

HENRY RAMSAY COLLINS died at Durban, Natal, on the 13th April, 1912, aged 62. Born in Gloucestershire, he gained his early experience with the Chester Hydraulic Company, Laird Brothers, Birkenhead, and on the London and North Western Railway. In 1872 he went to Natal and started a consulting practice in Durban. In that capacity he was associated with many important works, including municipal buildings and the Durban tramways. Subsequently he took up journalism and became a newspaper proprietor and editor.

Mr. Collins was elected an Associate Member of The Institution on the 6th March, 1877.

ALEXANDER McCULLOCH, born at Blairadam, N.B., on the 10th March, 1841, died in Edinburgh on the 27th October, 1912. After gaining practical experience in the Burgh Engineer's Office, Edinburgh, he took up consulting practice as an engineer and architect in Dundee. In that capacity he was responsible for waterworks at Carnoustie, the laying out of Duthie Park, Aberdeen, and of cemeteries at Glasgow and Montrose, and for various churches and public buildings in Dundee and elsewhere.

Mr. McCulloch was elected an Associate of The Institution on the 12th January, 1875, and was subsequently placed in the class of Associate Members.

RECAREDO DE UHAGON, born at Madrid on the 3rd January, 1848, died in that city on the 27th June, 1912. Trained in the Central School, he entered the Public Works service in 1870. After several years' service at the Ministry of Public Works, he
